CARTOONS AND ELEPHANTS IN ROOM 13 MUSEUM DISPLAY

West Highland Museum is host to an exhibition of artwork created by several young artists from Caol-based Room 13. Bright, colourful, eclectic and above all unlocking some amazing creativity, the works underline the level of creative talent in Lochaber.

Room 13 is a youth-led art studio in Caol Community Centre, where primary and secondary pupils and young adults have consistent access to a safe, creative space.

The various pieces on display are a great example of what can be achieved, with a glimpse into the vast cartoon world that young artist Ryan has created. There is also Ella's intriguing artworks featuring wartime letters presented in an imaginative and touching way.

Another work, created by Coll features massive elephants parading through the jungle which shows great imagination and skill, then there is the opportunity to dive into mixed media work from Amy, which is inspired by the water she loves so much.

Room 13 Lead artist, Richard Bracken said: "In this exhibition



young artists, Amy, Coll, Ella and Ryan, share their unique artworks, ideas and perspectives. All have attended Room 13 for many years, using the bright and friendly studio space to work at their own pace gaining new skills, social connections and confidence in the process.

"The artworks they have each chosen to exhibit reflect their diverse interests and abilities and give us insights into the special place that creativity holds in their lives. We look forward to more opportunities for young people to showcase their work to the wider community".

The exhibition will run until the end of April on the upper floor of the museum and is well worth a visit to gain inspiration from these young creatives.



Call out for smallscale local food growers & producers

Food Lochaber is part of the not-for-profit Lochaber Environmental Group charity (LEG). We support and promote local food production by running a collaborative food market where local food producers can easily sell fruit, veg, herbs, bread and cakes, meat, eggs, dairy, preserves etc to local customers through a regular online hub with minimum hassle.

There's no shortage of demand for locally-produced food. People increasingly see the benefit of knowing where their food's come from, that it hasn't



travelled 100s or 1000s of miles, and that more of their money stays circulating within our local economy.

We don't have enough producers to meet demand, so we're asking businesses and individuals to please get in touch if:

- you're already a food producer and would like to extend your reach to more Lochaber customers, or:
- you're already growing some food for your own use, and thinking about upscaling some produce for sale, or:
- you're already growing some food for your own use, and just sometimes have a surplus that you could sell (one advantage of FL's shop is that it works even if you only occasionally have a few courgettes or jars of honey) or:
- you don't yet grow or produce any food but think you might like to give it a go, or:
- you make/bake for sale using some local produce.

We've no strict criteria other than suppliers are Lochaber-based and we encourage sound sustainable, environmental and ethical practices, particularly minimising carbon emissions and reducing waste.

We've just one customer collection hub at the moment. at LEG's office at An Drochaid in Fort William. We're exploring ideas for satellite hubs, maybe in Acharacle in the first instance, maybe Roy Bridge. Duror and other outlying areas in due course. This will help producers reach more customers, and customers reach more producers while reducing food miles. A win-win! We'd love to hear from you if you'd like a chat about selling regularly or occasionally through us (we'd especially love to hear from any potential egg suppliers).

EASTER BISCUITS

A simple, traditional recipe which were baked, tied up with ribbon and given as Easter gifts.

• INGREDIENTS •

225g flour

115g butter

115g caster sugar

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1 egg

60g currants

A little grated lemon rind

- METHOD -

Rub the butter into the flour, add the sugar, lemon rind, baking powder and currants, moisten with the beaten egg. Roll out 1/4 inch thick and cut into biscuits with a round fluted cutter. Cook on a baking tray for 20 minutes at 170 degrees. Sprinkle with caster sugar as soon as removed from the oven.

Choosing a nest hox





Royal Society for the Protection of Rirds

Engaging with nature and helping the birds in your garden live healthy lives is an important aspect of our living environment. Introducing a nest box to your garden can significantly improve a bird's quality of life and is just as essential as a feeder or bird bath in your outdoor space.

Nestboxes generally fall into two categories: those with an entrance hole, providing a degree of protection from predators or open-fronted boxes. Look for those with holes if you want to attract smaller birds to your garden, such as the tit family, nuthatches, redstarts, tree and house sparrows.

It is important to choose a box with the appropriate hole size for the birds you want to attract. A 25-28mm hole is ideal for tits and tree sparrows, while a larger 45mm hole is better suited for larger birds such as starlings, doves, jackdaws and blackbirds to make their home in.

Open-fronted boxes, on the other hand, are favoured by birds that prefer nesting in the undergrowth, such as robins, wrens, wagtails and song thrushes.

Look for a nestbox that is made from insulating material



such as wood to combat the unpredictable UK climate, with walls at least 15mm thick and an internal floor space of a minimum of 130 sq cm (or 20 sq ins) to provide ample space for nesting and raising baby birds.

Choose a bird box that has drainage holes in the bottom and a sloped roof which help keep the box dry.

Bird boxes should be mounted high up in your garden or outdoor space, away from predators such as cats, ideally on walls, tree trunks, fences or posts. Boxes with holes are best placed around three metres high in trees, ideally camouflaged by foliage, while open-fronted boxes can be positioned closer to head height on walls or fences.

Avoid placing them in direct sunlight, as the excessive heat can be detrimental to the birds and their young so hang your

nestbox, facing either north or east, offering natural protection from the elements.

Cleaning bird boxes at the end of each nesting season prevents the spread of disease and maintains the health of your local garden birds. October or November is the ideal time to give your nestbox a good clean and refresh for the winter months.

Look for ones with an accessible roof or side hatch so you can easily access and remove the old nesting material from the birds and clean thoroughly. Always wear rubber gloves, use boiling water for cleaning and dispose of your cleaning brush immediately afterwards. Old nesting materials can be composted.

Inspect your bird boxes for any damage and make necessary repairs or replace them if needed.

When John arrived from Glasgow as the area's first brass instructor in 1974, he introduced Lochaber to wind band playing. Over the years, his colourful, energetic and easy-going character made him an inspiring teacher for many, and thanks to his ground-breaking efforts, we now have a thriving local community of brass and woodwind players of all ages.

But John's impact was not confined to Lochaber. Skye, Faslane, Leadhills, Edinburgh, Inverness, Thurso – even Sussex and Seville! – are all represented among the many players who will be joining Lochaber Community Wind Band in Fort William to celebrate the positive influence that John has had on their lives.

The concert will not only cel-



ebrate John as an educator and conductor, but as a versatile musician who loved good music of any genre. The programme will therefore include specially invited friends and former students as guest performers, including Lochaber Gaelic Choir and the Great Glen Swing Band, with jazz trumpeter Philip Cardwell. Trombone-playing will, of course, feature prominently, for while John was a dedicated teacher and conductor, he was a trombonist at heart.

John formed Lochaber Community Wind Band in 1996 to provide a playing opportunity for his students after leaving Lochaber High School, and to make sure new Lochaber residents with a band-playing past could continue their hobby in this part of the world. April's

concert will be a true testament to the success of his endeavours.

Stepping in to conduct this mass of talent is John's dear friend and fellow trombonist Alan Fernie, an internationally renowned composer for brass and wind bands. We are extremely grateful to Alan for taking on this enormous task. In turn, Alan welcomes being able to play a pivotal part in the memorial event.

In his words: 'We are going to put on a rightly brilliant concert for our friend, John!'

MASONS MOVED BY UKRAINE AID TALK



Aid to Ukraine and the plight of those caught up in the war was the topic of a talk given by John Bryden of the charity Kirsty's Kids to members to Masonic Lodge, of Fort William No 43, who took what he revealed very much to heart, making a substantial donation to help his relief work.

John and wife Jan founded Kirsty's Kids in memory of their daughter whose ambition It was to work with children.

The couple then turned their home into a retreat for children and families facing hardship or suffering from the effects of serious, often terminal illnesses.

Over the years Jan and John have carried out many other acts of kindness and generosity, two of which were travelling





to England after a flood – two instances were helping dry-out homes through his business free of charge – and even delivering Christmas parcels (dressed as Santa) to local children who have had very few or no presents at all.

They have also faced their own hardships in Lochailort when a flash flood swept down the hill behind their home, destroying most of the buildings and special facilities they had created for the good of others. They did not give up and over time, with the help of volunteers, managed to restore most of what was lost.

More recently John and Jan have made collections of food, clothing, toiletries and many other items for the people of Ukraine and delivered them in person to those in need.

Driving their van from Lochailort to Ukraine, packed with humanitarian supplies. has seen them coming under fire many times from Russian missiles, drones and artillery. Their most recent visit was to the front line city of Kherson, which is under almost constant bombardmen by a Russian battery that was deliberately positioned against the wall of a power station so Ukrainian forces would be reluctant to fight back in case they hit the building.

On taking cover in the basement of a wrecked block of flats they found it full of young children, whose only light was provided by torches as electricity had been cut off.

John said: "It was so sad to



see the youngsters huddled together, not even looking afraid but just numb to the explosions and noise which have become part of their everyday lives.

"These children also had nothing to distract them from their horrendous surroundings, so I asked the soldiers who accompanied us if they knew where we could get supplies of such things as colouring in books, pencils, jotters and school books to read."

The soldiers said they knew of a warehouse a few kilometres away but it would very dangerous to get to them. However, John eventually persuaded them and a semi-armoured military vehicle took them to the store of supplies where they collected as much as they could to take back to the children.

"The children were delighted," said Jan, "and it was amazing to see the smiles on their faces as they looked through what they had been given. The conditions

were still dark and miserable with the sounds of war, but such simple things as books and pencils gave them a real boost and brought so much pleasure. It was both a happy and sad sight."

Being aware that many parts of Ukraine had little or no electricity due to Russian attacks on the power networks, the couple also took a small diesel generator to provide some localised power. They discovered that many people arrived to charge their mobile phones as they desperately tried to stay in touch with friends and relatives in there areas.

Such was the importance of the generator that some people brought along a gazebo to erect over it, protecting it and the users from bad weather. Others brought small amounts of diesel fuel (often all of what they had) to help keep it running and it became a meeting place while phones charged, with everyone patiently waiting their turn.

John had many more stories about the conditions in Ukraine, which so moved the audience that an impromptu collection from those in the hall raised an additional £300 to the £1,000 they had already donated. This will also help the Ukrainian economy as John and Jan also take money to buy products which are available locally, helping to support local businesses in difficult times.

Master of the Lodge, Peter Kelly said: "Everyone was glued to every word John said. It is amazing what they do with very little regard for their own safety in getting directly to the people who need their help. We are honoured to help in some way."

Jan and John are now in the process of raising money and collecting items for their next trip planned for later this year to try and relieve some of the suffering in Ukraine, especially for children. Anyone wishing to help can contact them at kirstyskids.org.



GLENCOE MASSACRE 333RD ANNIVERSARY

The events in Glencoe on February 13th, 1692, when the Clan MacDonald were attacked by British soldiers linked to Clan Campbell, are very well known across the world as an act of murder and infamy.

Recorded in stories, songs and folklore, it is also commemorated each year with a march to the monument built at Carnach near Glencoe Village, which not only involves local people, but members of the clan and clan societies from other parts of Scotland and all over the world.

Every year is special for those who attend and even though this took place a couple of months ago it is worth mentioning that the 2025 ceremony





marks the 333rd anniversary. After a service in the Episcopal church a large group made their way to the Bridge of Coe where they formed into a procession, marching to the monument.

Pipe Major Brian Heriot piped the March to the Massacre Cross from Bridge of Coe, with Reverend Amanda Fairclough carrying out the service.

Niall Archibald recited Psalm 121 in Gaelic, wreaths were laid by Glencoe Heritage Trust, Clan Donald Society of Scotland, NTS Glencoe, and other floral tributes were laid. Representatives of various MacDonald organisations from across the world then took the opportunity to lay wreaths around the base of the cross, including Scott MacDonald and his young son, Grayson.

They, together with several generations of their family, have been travelling from the Central Belt to take part for the last 40 years, making a visit to the monument in the early morning, at the exact time the attack is thought to have begun.








LUNDAVRA PUPILS ASK FOR ACTION AGAINST DOG POO

Every Thursday Primary 6 pupils from Lundavra School make their way to the Fort William Leisure Centre for swimming lessons. They walk the same route each time down Lundavra Road onto Alma Road and then to the swimming pool.

They are all very excited about their regular outing but have noticed one problem that is only getting worse – dog poo. To avoid getting it on their shoes and clothes they often have to leave the pavement and walk on the road. This in itself is a risky business for 20+ children and staff, but always done very carefully and safely.

However, the children have taken note of a greater danger, the diseases which can be contracted from the poo itself.

The class, under the direction of teacher Mr James Ross have been researching the ill-effects of dog poo and are very concerned by what they have discovered. Salmonella, worms, stomach bugs, even blindness



can be result of infections carried in dog dirt.

Shocked by what they found out, each pupil has written a letter, all of which will be passed to the Local MP, MSP and members of The Highland Council, highlighting the problem and suggesting solutions. These are extracts from a few of them.

Kia aged 10: "Every Thursday my class and I walk to to the swimming pool there is always something very disgusting! When we walk down Alma Road there is a lot of dog poo".

Rudi aged 11: "...dog poop can contain Roundworm eggs which can become infectious, particularly for children. If they accidentally swallow them they can hatch in the intestine, go into the bloodstream and cause health problems. You wouldn't want that to happen?"

Sergey aged 10: "Did you know dog dirt is gonna be so hard to take off your clothes and shoes? Your stomach is gonna be upset and can cause sore throats, asthma and in some cases, blindness. Dog dirt is dangerous".

Maiah aged 10: "All we are trying to do is walk to the swimming pool and it is being ruined by lots of dog poop – it makes me sick! There should be signs [telling] people to pick up their dog poop. I am asking you to help us try and stop people leaving it on the pavement".

The children have spoken!

CONCERNED ABOUT AN ADULT AT RISK?

People concerned for the welfare of an adult at risk are often unsure who to speak to about it. Here is some information from the NHS Highland website about reporting an Adult Concern:

In Scotland, the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 exists to protect adults from harm. This harm may include physical, financial, sexual or psychological abuse, or neglect or discrimination.

If you are unable to protect yourself from being harmed, it is important to tell someone. If you think you know someone who is being harmed, or at risk of being harmed, you must tell someone. Please remember that the person being harmed may not be able to report it themselves.

In the Highland area, the related social work duties and actions are undertaken by NHS Highland's Adult Social Care service.

If someone is in imminent danger, a call to the emergency services may be required:

Emergency police and ambulance services – 999

Non-emergency police – 101 NHS 24 – 111 To Report an Adult Concern in Lochaber

During normal office hours – please use the Adult Social Care Team contacts:

Outside of normal office hours:





ARROWS FLY AS 90+ PLAYERS 'OCHE UP



The recent Duncan Rodger Memorial darts tournament in Fort William saw 38 youngsters of Primary and High School ages step up to the Oche for an exciting afternoon of play in Sunny's Sports Bar – Fort William's version of the darting dream venue Alexandra Palace. This was followed in the evening by 59 adults throwing in the senior competition.

Held in memory of the highly regarded, talented, all-round sportsman and darts player its aim was not only to raise money for charity but also to give young people the opportunity to develop an interest in the sport.

Organiser and Darts enthusiast Martyn Cameron said: "Scoring highest of the lot in the Primary section was the smallest of them all, Brodie Campbell, who has a massive future ahead of him in the game of darts. Runner-up was Fergus

Molde who travelled from England.

In an exciting High School competition that led to what was described as 'a gem of a final,' tournament favourite, Campbell Burnett from Fort Augustus took on Donald Campbell from Oban. Both missed doubles in the first leg for a high finish, with Campbell taking first place.

While the Juniors finished in the afternoon, the adults signed in for the Senior competition that evening. This attracted an entry of 59 singles players and ran on until after midnight.

Winner was Martyn Cameron for the third year in succession with a final score of five legs to one against runner-up Evan Atkinson. Other runners-up were Ballachulish man Darren Sutherland, beaten by Martyn four legs to one, and Oban League Champ six seasons in a row, Adam Brook, beaten by Evan four legs to three, with prizes presented to them by

Duncan's Mother, Patti. Adults' entry fees and a raffle raised £860 which will be donated to Motor Neuron Disease Scotland (in support of local shinty player Lachlan Campbell) and £450 was paid out in prizes over three competitions.

However the opportunity to play darts is not limited to an annual competition, as Monday is weekly league at Sunny's. Vault 11.0, which is sanctioned by the Amateur Darts Co-operation, is open to anyone over 14 years old, but only the first 24 online entries made through DartsAtlas, events Vault 11.0@ SunnysSportsBat.



PAWEL'S RECORD RUN

Mallaig athlete Pawel Cymbalista has just chalked up another record, running the West Highland Way (supported) winter in a time of 19 hours, 30 minutes and 9 seconds. He already holds the supported summer record of 17:57:35, which he set in 2022, also coming fourth in the WHW Race in 2023.

Speaking about his latest challenge Pawel said: "I like to start the year with a big challenge and without a doubt it was that. The West Highland Way is always just that.

"The weather was kind to me most of the time. I had a couple of snow showers and towards the end the wind started to pick up increasing the wind chill. The temperature was around -2°C but the wind was going right through my body making it feel much colder."

Pawel's team consisted of



friends and family brother-in-law Ryan, Scott Brown, wife Ashley, Monty, Ben Miller, Ruairdh Oliver-Jones, Stuart Malcolm, Manny Gorman and Coalin Finn

"The whole team worked very hard and we had an amazing time on the trail," he said: "Nonetheless it was very tough and I had a five-minute break every time I stopped to refuel, refill and readjust myself. Anything longer

than five minutes resulted in my body temperature dropping and I started to shiver."

His biggest challenge was the cold wind, ice, frozen rocks in random patches and he required constant focus, and on eating and drinking plenty so he had the fuel to create energy to regulate body temperature.

Another challenge was many roots and sharp rocks sticking out of the ground, and an early section when he couldn't find a good rhythm. Darkness also plays a big part in winter long distance running but Pawel is comfortable with that.

However he had many positives on the trail, running many sections of the WHW that in his own record time from Milngavie to Inverarnan, Bridge of Orchy to Glencoe Mountain Resort to Kinlochleven. He said he found



these "absolutely amazing".

Unfortunately he also had a few trips and slips, twisting his right ankle on a rock, putting a lot of pressure on the hamstring and lower back causing discomfort and pain.

He said: "I had 16km (10 miles to go) to Fort William and had to grind it out. I was very focused on my body and trying to keep everything aligned so I would not cause more damage. I was chasing the clock as well. I knew I would grab the record if I just keep pushing it. It was a real fight but I made it! Thanks to my support team who never gave up on me and pushed me to the end.

"I have big dreams and ideas of what I would like to achieve and I will keep at it as long as I can. I am only 37 years old. I am planning to keep going until I'm 60 or more!"
